As we turn the page into November, we enter a season that invites us to pause, remember, and give thanks. The air is crisp, the leaves have fallen, and soon the scent of Thanksgiving meals will fill our homes. But before the busyness of the holidays overtakes us, we are reminded that gratitude is more than a day—it's a way of living.

This month at Racine First United Methodist Church, we begin a new sermon series titled "The Days Are Surely Coming." True gratitude doesn't come from having everything we want—it comes from recognizing that, in Christ, we already have more than enough.

As we move through November, may our hearts overflow with gratitude for all that God has done, is doing, and will continue to do among us. Let us be a community known for our thanksgiving—not only on one Thursday in November, but every day, in every act of love, service, and worship.

You may donate through the loose change offering or write a check to the church with Thanksgiving free meal on the memo line for a table that costs \$75 each. Methodist women will supplement the collection amount so that we contribute at least one table, we hope to do more.
- 2. Also, you may donate to the Northside Food Pantry by bringing food to church or just write a check to church with Northside Food Pantry on the memo line. Both food and money will go to the pantry. We usually serve about twenty-five families, but we are serving more people and last month, we had to close early because of lack of food.

Thank you for thinking of others and contributing when you can. Your help is much appreciated and the volunteers who represent our church on the third Thursday of each month appreciate your kindness.

UPDATE ON "LITTLE JAKES"

I'm Carol, one of the Board members OF Jabez Elementary and High School, and I had the privilege of talking with Jakes on a video chat using WhatsApp (a very popular free messaging service).

Jakes completed the
8th and 9th grades
at Jabez. He studied
English, Math,
Science, Civics,
Physical Education,
and his two favorite
subjects Geography
and History. His

extra curriculum subjects including tailoring which did not generate a lot of interest on his part and the computer class which he thoroughly enjoyed. He learned many functions in Word including how to create documents.

When asked what were the initial adjustments he had to make when he started the 8th grade in a new country, he was quick to reply that he had to wear a uniform and cut his hair short in order to conform to the school dress code. He was also challenged to understand Liberian English. There are significant differences in pronunciation, accent, and vocabulary compared to American English. He is much more comfortable now with the language of the environment and can make friends more easily.

Food is important to all teenagers, of course. His breakfasts in Wisconsin might be pancakes, waffles, or bacon and eggs. He mentioned, without a great deal of enthusiasm,

that he now has rice for the morning meal just like his counterparts!

Comparing teachers/classes between Wisconsin and Jabez, he remarked that in the US there were more students in class and the school day was longer. At Jabez he definitely had more homework even with a shorter school day. The language challenge was present in the classroom as well.

Even though the school day at Jabez is from 8 am to 1 pm, it actually begins at 7:30 with devotions. The children sing gospel music, pray, and each class contributes a Bible verse followed by a teacher who preaches. Jakes enjoys music and is learning to play the keyboard. He brought it with him to Liberia as music is an important part of his life. He does play the keyboard for their family devotions at home.

His secondary school education will take place at St. Lawrence Catholic School and he looks forward to being a passenger on a motorbike as his primary means of transportation to school. We of the Jabez Board wish Jakes and the other 9th graders who finished Jabez on July 7th a wonderful first year of high school.

I found Jakes to be a young man of faith and courage and determination as he crossed cultures during these formative years. He was delightful to chat with and I wish somehow I could send him a waffle/pancake/bacon and egg breakfast!

Urgent: Hurricane Melissa Makes Landfall in Jamaica — You Can Help
